A guided tour of the Tyne Theatre and Opera House in Newcastle was arranged; KAREN REVELL and I were the only APPA pensioners there but the visit was very interesting and worthwhile.



The theatre opened in 1867 and has gone through many management changes and several reincarnations in the years since. For a long time, it was a cinema (which is how I first came to know it) before being converted back into a theatre in 1974.
